

My dear Mother Sunday P. M.

Feb 23rd 1923

Dear brother and sister,

Every thing is at sixes and sevens, or I am at least, can't think how to even spell. I have been terribly muddled for over a week, can't tell how, why every thing seems to be a flat black at times, its so slippery and I have not dared to go out to get a stamp and send the boys money. Lela is going down town about three. if she has time will see to it. if not I'll get it as soon as I possibly can. I had a nice letter from Tom today, said he was going to visit to Jim, and Len, who had a nice long letter from Walter, thanking us for the candy, he addressed it "Nanny Lee, Chalato, Co."

I wrote Aunt Jennie a long letter to say it-
~~got return~~ was returned. I took the address
from the Logans. Herb may have been home, sick
all the week, given it to the slave all right.
Aunt-Kate only sits up about-half
the time. has branched ~~the~~ ^{best} ~~the~~
water mixes the medicine his father
is taking is helping him they think.
I wrote Jim the first of week, to see if
he got the coal. have not heard a word.
none of them have written me word
about the candy. from Jim's. I wish they
would let me know about the coal. I think
it ought to be worth a pretty good
worn coal. Charles paid me hundred and ten

dollars. of course its worth some but not
ragged. I sent it had it insured. so it dont
cost them one cent. when I sent it I wrote
a letter and asked some of them to let me
know if they got it. I want father learn to let
me know. it dont make my me feel like
spending much time or money. Ben has
been home three days this week, coming again.
Tuesday afternoon, to day is Carrie Susseus first day 42
same age as Ben. Ben has filled her up a nice
box of candy. Charles is going to let the girls have
money, to fix up about-half the basement get them
a large stove and mortar slab. then they can
make in one batch as much fondant as they
~~have to make in~~ in one batch as it takes them to make
five more, and much easier for them. they
will make fondant in basement. Orville, and John
and Jack in attic. Charles has seen what good
to the girls, and Lou. the girls appreciate it too.

I could talk if I could see you. I told Lela
this morning if the children had two weeks
vacation this spring and you were
back well enough, I take them and go
home for the two weeks. Then make my
exit later. But she says they only
have one week. she has gone and
forgot my letter. But I'll certainly
see Angus & make next week.
